
## QUILT AD

### Israel Food Outreach

*Israel Food Outreach*, working hand in hand with *Gleanings for the Hungry*, shipped two forty foot containers to Israel, which arrived mid-February 2014. They contained 42,000 pounds of dried soup mix each, plus a total of about 150 hand made quilts. The quilts are given only to Holocaust survivors in Israel who are living below the poverty level. There are about 65,000 survivors who call Israel home and live below the poverty level. As one can see from the pictures, the recipients are very grateful to receive the soup and quilts.







#### Michael and Ana (Names Changed for Privacy) Israel

Michael is 88 years old, born in Moldovia; Ana was born in the Ukraine. They immigrated in 1992 because the anti-Semitism was so bad there. "Nobody likes us in the world," is Ana's statement.

Ana and her entire family were sent to Akmolinskiy Concentration Camp, located in their village of Malinkova. Being the only concentration camp located in the Soviet Union, it was established for mothers, wives, and daughters of men considered traitors to Germany. Everyone was hungry. From there they were moved to the ghetto of Lager, where Ana's mother was beaten and died.

Michael was in a different Ukrainian ghetto. Nearby were the Partisans, those in the underground who sabotaged the German army and lived in the forests. The Partisans would help feed the people held in the ghetto by bringing them food and meat. As a child in the ghetto, Michael envied the dogs who roamed free.

Ana and Michael met after the war. He spent three years in the Soviet army and married Ana after his release. Michael was raised in a devout Jewish home and was often sought by others to receive a blessing from HaShem. His occupation after the army was a shoemaker. He used to carry all his tools with him and still has them to this day.Currently, Ana and Michael live in a very old apartment in much need of repair. Ana said, "It seems after the way we lived in the war, it is not right that we live so poorly. Even the dogs on the streets live better."

Even so, they are both grateful to be in Israel and say, "As long as we have a piece of bread to eat we are thankful."

P.S. - Renovation work has begun in their apartment by the *Saxon Friends of Israel*.



#### Quilt Ministry Expands and Multiplies

Israel Food Outreach's goal is to ship 500 quilts to Holocaust survivors this year. Here at Gleanings we have been sewing heaps of beautiful quilts, but know we are unable to reach this amount. We are excited at an opportunity that arose to help Youth With A Mission's Los Angeles base begin a quilting ministry. In March, three eager women from L.A. came to learn from Norma Gove, our quilt room supervisor. At the L.A. YWAM base a room was cleared, a quilting table made, and these ladies went right to work producing quilts. A 20 minute teaching video was also made and is being distributed to interested churches who desire to come alongside and help accomplish this worthy goal.
