

Kenyan Outreach

Africa. Kenya, Africa, a diverse country in the middle of East Africa, home to the Discipleship Training School this January and February. To draw you a bit further into their world, I invite you to read, absorb, ponder, and enjoy the tales of average people called by an incredible

God. This is their story. The journey started on December 30, 2014. Nineteen people piled into vehicles driving four hours to a L.A. airport hotel. After a restful night's sleep the DTS team settled in for over 26 hours of travel. It took three airplane rides, two layovers, and an extremely bumpy ride from Nairobi, to finally arrive at the first Kenyan destination, Kijabe.

Kijabe is a quaint little town, that is so meshed with the African Inland Mission (AIC) station, that you can't tell where one ends and the other begins. It sits on a hill in the midst of a cloistered jungle. The team worked with Pastor Simon Muhato of the Kijabe AIC church, a round man of average height, with a huge grin, who quickly brings a person from acquaintance to familial friend. As Simon steered us around the surrounding region, we viewed his heart of love for people in different situations. The group dearest to his heart was his orphans. He and his wife started an orphanage years ago to bring hope to the street children. They call him Baba (Daddy) and Simon considers the children an extension of his family.

After a heartfelt good-bye, the DTS hit the road two weeks later for an 8-hour journey, to arrive across the country in Kitale. The team spent a very packed and life-changing ten days in Kitale. At this location the first healings were witnessed and medical treatment given.

Not only were physical bodies impacted in these short ten days, but spiritual ground was being broken. Elizabeth, a tall, beautiful Kenyan with a stunning smile, joined our team for almost every ministry event. She is a single mother of three, whose heart is to begin a ministry for single mothers like her. One hot summer day, ministry was to a group of single mothers; it took one momentous instant for Elizabeth to move from a spectator to boldly stepping into her God-given calling. A team member approached Elizabeth about sharing her story with the "mamas". Nervously, Elizabeth accepted the offer to speak, mentioning she had never spoken to single moms. As she was anxiously fidgeting in her seat, waiting her turn to share, God's spirit was descending. By the time she opened her mouth, the room was in rapt attention and hearts ready for change. It was a privilege for the team to witness a fellow believer step up and rise to her purpose. At that point, her life was altered. She couldn't believe her ministry had been initiated by a group of Mazungus (white people).

The team resided in the third largest city in Kenya, Kisumu, for the bulk of their time. They experienced culture shock when working with the street boys and people living at the dump. Hearts embraced a young girl, Mercy, who sought medical aid. People's faith was nurtured as more healings were experienced. As the trip came to a close, the single guys, led by Fritz, had the opportunity to rough it out in Northern Kenyan, Turkana territory. They spent hours traveling along unmarked, sandy roads to find the

Turkana tribe. For some of the Turkanas, it was the first time they had seen white people. Food and Gleanings' peaches were brought to feed a people who considered themselves lucky when they ate one meal a day. Despite the extreme poverty and lack of food, they seemed incredibly healthy. It was as though God miraculously multiplied the nutritional value of their simple meals. They worshipped God with energy and enthusiasm, and gave generously.

The DTS concluded just outside Nairobi at YWAM Athi River Muchakos base, a beautiful and simplistic facility, to debrief the trip. The outreach had challenges, such as living in tight quarters, comparing our lives with the Kenyan people, and walking in love and humility. But through all the difficulties and times of joy, God revealed Himself in such unique ways. It can definitely be proclaimed that God was faithful and the lives of our team members weren't the only ones altered. He used ordinary people to do His marvelous work.
