The Gleanings Discipleship Training School team returns from international outreach on March 1st. Here is an update we received while they were at Site of Hope in Eswatini:

What is Site of Hope?

Site Of Hope (SOH) is a home for girls who have experienced sexual abuse, many of whom were abused by family members. SOH is the only place in the whole country of eSwatini that has the capacity to take in abused girls, especially pregnant girls. It is a Christian home and community whose goal is to help the girls live on their own, without having to go back to an abusive situation. Because of their pregnancy, the girls were forced to stop their regular schooling. While our DTS team was at SOH, a new girl arrived with a one-month-old baby. Perhaps she could have found a distant relative to help her, and perhaps she could have aborted or discarded her own baby. Home wasn't safe anymore, and her situation was hopeless, so she chose to seek help from SOH.

How has the DTS team served at Site of Hope?

We helped the girls with their studies for four hours each day. We offered tutoring in subjects like science and math. We also had game times with the girls and the kids, and hosted a preschool event for the community, and 61 kids came. We also worked on various chores, painting, and maintenance projects around the *SOH* property. *SOH* has many buildings on the property. We've been building drainage systems to protect from rain and mud, as well as a fence to help prevent theft.

How did you use Gleanings soup mix in eSwatini?


We had the opportunity to go with some of the girls into the community to serve. We brought Gleanings food to the primary school. The school kitchen was very humble, only a tin roof with a pot. We visited a grandmother, or gogo (in Siswati), who lives in a homestead three miles away. She can't walk. She has nothing. She has little or no access to water and food. For the previous month, all she had for food was some prickly pears that grew naturally. When we arrived at her house, she had completely run out of food two days beforehand. We were able to bring her bags of *Gleanings* soup mix. We also helped her with some yard work and house cleaning, and we took time to pray with her. It was an incredible hands-on experience for our DTS team to show God's love.

What are you learning about the Lord during this outreach?

We worship a radical God who loves us radically. Many babies are placed in a plastic bag and discarded into the river. Many babies die, but some get caught on a branch, and they are found, and they live. They are taken in by Christian ministries. Like Moses, who was drawn out of a river because of God's plan, these babies are rescued from death out of the river. Why does God want them to live? What does God have in store for their lives? The girls have shown us what radical faith means. When God saves you in a radical way, you respond in a radical way, with radical love. We came to pour into the girls, yet they are pouring into us. Every morning, we get 42 hugs from the girls, and 42 hugs every night before we go to bed. They share stories of anguish and pain, yet they have joy, and they love the Lord so much. They are giving glory to God. The girls have helped us grow in our faith and joy in the Lord.

How can we pray for eSwatini?

Please pray for them to be able to find water for the community. Fresh drinking water is very limited. The community is trying to dig a well. They have failed many times. The soil is very rocky. The nearby river is the only source, but it is not clean, and they lack the resources for proper water treatment. Many resort to collecting small amounts of rainwater. The people need food as well. There is no food in the government programs.
