COUNTRY REPORT:

GUATEMALA





team of farmers, Mission Builders, and Gleanings staff members visited Hope of the Nations Guatemala in February 2025. Kent and Darla Pierce are farmers from Saskatchewan, Canada who donate semi-loads of peas and lentils each year for Gleanings soup mix. After hearing about the recent trip to Hope of the Nations Guatemala (July 2024), Kent and Darla asked Andy and Chelsea to go again, so they could also meet the people who eat the peas and lentils from their fields. Kent and Darla fundraised at their home church in Canada to make the trip happen, and more team members joined: Henrijs Janbergs (Gleanings staff) and Ken and Emily Krahn (retired farmers, Mission Builders). The group of seven joined Eric and Lisa Rivera, Pastor Billy, and Sue Ross for a week of delivering boxes of soup mix and dried peaches to communities in the mountains of Guatemala. With our translators and drivers, we had three truckloads of volunteers, food, and supplies.

We visited Savana Grande, Brasil, Las Llaves, San Juan Mixtan, and a coffee farm. People were quick to welcome us because we were with Eric and Billy, who have spent years of their lives building relationships and trust. At three of the locations, we cooked Gleanings soup mix. It was an honor to shop before each visit to bring plenty of chicken, eggs, vegetables, and seasonings to add to the large pot of soup we would make for the community.

Henrijs: "So many people were waiting for us, waiting for the food when we got there. That moment was powerful for me. It touched my heart when I saw the kids receiving the food."

Chelsea: "It was a joy to chop vegetables with the women, chatting with them in my broken Spanish. The most exciting moment was pouring the soup mix into the pot of boiling water. It is so simple but so profound, knowing all the work and generosity that went into those bags of soup. It was Kent and

Darla's peas going into that big pot. It was an honor. As I watched the kids eat spoonfuls of soup, I realized what our mission is, our reason for serving at *Gleanings*: to see a hungry child eat a bowl of soup. All given in the name of Jesus."


Sue: "I learned that when the truck leaves here with the soup mix, the journey doesn't end for it. The ministry that distributes the soup mix has another, sometimes arduous, task. In Guatemala, the truck is packed wwwith soup mix, the crew is driving down the roads, and my prayers go with them—for the truck to hold up, for the drivers, the missionaries. They sacrifice so much to see the soup mix delivered to the villages. There the people are reminded that God sees them and heals their children through nutrients that come from the ground in Saskatchewan and Montana. Wow, God!"

Andy: "In an organization and work of providing millions of meals, it's essential for us to go and meet the individuals we serve. It's a measure of us being rooted in our original calling. This is what it means to keep our eyes on our purpose: to share the love to Christ with individual kids. To know their names."

Hope of the Nations delivers food to communities in Guatemala with the goal of bringing food where it is needed most—especially the places where no one else wants to go. Some remote villages have no church and no pastor to shepherd them: these are the people that Eric and Lisa Rivera have served and loved in Guatemala. "Ever since moving to Guatemala, it's easy to feel lonely and forgotten," Lisa said. "Having our Gleanings family come to visit us reminds us that God sees us, and we are not forgotten."

We care about our ministry partners and the people they serve. It was an honor to pray for the sick, give hugs, food, guilts, hats, and shoes, and see young people put their faith in Christ. And everywhere we went, the women asked us, "Please, can you send more food?" We will certainly try.
